WEDDING - A BTBG REFORMED PROCEDURE

WHY MARRIAGE

Marriage, a legally and socially sanctioned union between men and women, has been around for over 4,350 years. It originated in Mesopotamia and quickly became popular among ancient Hebrews, Greeks, and Romans. People get married for various reasons, from sentimental reasons such as companionship and family building to practical considerations such as tax breaks, increased financial stability, and medical insurance.

RIPPLES TURNING INTO WAVES

It is time to acknowledge that while marriage remains a fundamental pillar of human relations, wedding activities and rituals need to change. The focus should be on the quality of the relationship and the values it represents rather than adhering to outdated traditions or indulging in extravagant ceremonies. The demands on finances, time, and reasoning during the week-long and endless rituals before and after the wedding day are unacceptable. These rituals, including mantras and hymns that are hardly understood, are being followed without any appreciation of their meaning and significance. It is time to recognise that these dead rituals are no longer relevant and must be left behind.

A ROADMAP FOR AN ALTERNATE JOURNEY

A wedding Protocol that is both straightforward and significant has been devised, adhering to the integrated philosophy of four eminent philosophers and social reformers: Lord Buddha, Gurudev Tagore, Netaji Bose, and Mahatma Gandhi (BTBG). The BTBG Protocol is impartial to the age, religion, sect, and financial status of the individuals involved in the union.

According to this Protocol, an ideal wedding under the BTBG scheme could be completed in less than 36 hours and may consist of the following sequence of steps:

GENERAL CONDITIONS

- 1. It is advisable to consider cost-saving measures and avoid ostentatious displays of wealth when organising a wedding. To achieve this, it is recommended that a wedding venue be chosen from a range of commonplace locations such as hotels, convention centres, guesthouses, or private resorts that are mutually convenient for both parties. Additionally, it is suggested that the wedding cost be shared equally between the bride and groom parties to ensure fairness.
- 2. When choosing a location, it is essential to consider the availability of at least 50 rooms in the vicinity or within the venue, depending on the number of relatives and close friends attending. For instance, if the wedding is expected to have 20 close relatives and friends from each party in attendance, 80

people will require accommodation. In such a scenario, it is recommended that 40-45 rooms be reserved in the hotel to accommodate them for two nights.

DAY ONE:

- (a) Noon: Relatives and Friends should arrive at the venue and check in to their respective rooms by 2 PM.
- (b) 4 PM: MEHNDI CEREMONY. The mingling of Family members and close friends will be especially encouraged
- (c) The photo and video shoot of the engaged couple will take place separately.
- (d) 7 PM: Ice-breaker evening party for all relatives and close friends. The WBMC will also be present, and all relatives will be introduced to them through an information slide, family photographs and family trees.
- (e) The evening party Ice-breaker aims to encourage mingling between relatives from both sides of the family and to help everyone get to know each other. This will help bring the two families together as one strong family.
- (f) After the introduction, live ghazals and semi-classical dance will be presented.
- (g) The evening programme will conclude with a dinner for about 100 relatives and friends.
- (h) The Bride and Groom will spend the night with their families, not together.

DAY TWO:

- (a) 11 AM: HALDI CEREMONY: The Bride and groom are to be brought to a commonplace for the Haldi ceremony in the presence of their relatives.
- (b) 01 PM: Lunch
- (c) 4.30 PM: The other Invitees and dignitaries to start coming (Total say 300)
- (d) 06 PM: Actual Wedding (See below for details)
- (e) 7.30 PM: Reception-Dinner for Relatives (80) + Other Invitees (300)
- (f) 10 PM: All invitees except the Core relatives and close friends to leave the venue.
- (g) 11 PM: The FIRST Wedding night for the newly married couple starts.

DAY THREE:

- (a) 8 AM: Breakfast for relatives served
- (b) 10 AM: All the Relatives leave the Venue.

Details of ACTUAL WEDDING

Day 2, 5.55 PM	All dignitaries, invitees (300) and relatives (80) must take their identified seats in the large 500-seater Banquet Hall.
Dais Arrangement	On the dais, two transparent Pedestal-Podiums (fitted with stereo microphones) will be placed on either side of the dais. A little behind at
	the centre, between these two pedestals, will be a large rectangular Table with 6 chairs facing the audience. This table will later be used by the Bride, Groom and their parents to sign the Marriage Registration Forms
6 PM	The Bride, her parents and a small group of relatives will enter the hall
0 T W	and walk slowly and ceremoniously towards the left side of the elevated platform. The Bride and her parents will climb onto the platform while the relatives sit in the audience.
6.10 PM	The groom, his parents and a small group of relatives will enter the hall slowly and ceremoniously. They will move towards the right side of the elevated platform, where the groom and his parents will climb onto the platform. The rest of the relatives will be accommodated in the audience.
6.20 PM	The bride and groom will stand before the pedestal podiums, and their respective parents will stand by their side.
6.25 PM	The Groom will first read out the OATH OF MARRIAGE in front of guests.
6.35 PM	The Bride will read out the OATH OF MARRIAGE in front of guests.
6.45 PM	 The next part of the ceremony involves the Bride and the Groom exchanging garlands by placing them on each other's necks. Following this, the Bride and Groom will seek blessings from their respective parents and parents-in-law, standing behind them by
6.50 PM	touching their feet. The newly-wed couple and their parents will sit on chairs on one side of
0.30 PW	the oval-shaped table and sign the marriage registration papers amidst clapping by the audience. The four parents will also sign as witnesses.
7.00 PM	In the meantime, the two podiums will be quickly removed from the dais
	 The couple will then stand at the center of the dais, ready to receive their guests.
	The top dignitaries, relatives, friends, and guests will approach the dais from one side to meet and congratulate the couple and exit from the other side. All in the couple and congratulate Bining Company and the Bining Com
	 All invitees will then move towards the Dining Space. After receiving greetings from approximately 400 guests, the couple will descend from the dais and take the blessings of the senior family
	members from both sides. They will then leave for the dining hall.
All through 5:30 to 7:30 PM, the Shehnai of Bismillah Khan will play on the central audio
